Ganesh Chaturdhi & Significance

Lord Ganesha - the Elephant headed God



Lord Ganesha, is depicted as the elephant God with elephant head (*Gaja mukha*), riding a mouse (*Mushika Vahana*) with one tusk (*Eka Danta*) and a bowl of sweet in one hand (*Modaka Hasta*), having a curved trunk (*Vakra Tunda*), big ears and a huge potbellied (*Lambodara*) body of a human being.

Significance of Lord Ganesha

According to Hindu Tradition, Lord Ganesha considered as the first and virtual son of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati, who is widely worshipped by all and traditionally prayed in the beginning of any new venture or every ritual event. He is the Lord of success

and destroyer of evils and obstacles. As he is the remover of obstacles (Vighnas), he is also called Vighneswara. "Viyate Nayake Iti Vinaayaka" — meaning Vinayaka is a master unto himself. He is the master of all Pramada ganas -master of masters. It is also believed that, Lord Vinayaka confers success in all endeavors. Even Lord Shiva, the father of Vinayaka, worships His son at the time of obstructions. He symbolizes the qualities of a true leader in all aspects. He is also worshipped as the god of knowledge, wisdom and wealth.

The Universe is sustained by *Ganas* (Gods) and *Ganapathi* is their master. '*Ga*' symbolises *Buddhi* (intellect), '*Na*' stands for *Vijnana* (wisdom). So, Ganapati is the master of *Buddhi* and *Vijnana*. His vehicle *mooshika* does not mean a mere mouse. It symbolizes the darkness of ignorance because it is in darkness that the mouse moves about. Hence, *Mooshika Vahana* is one who subdues ignorance and dispels darkness. Ganesha's elephant head itself symbolizes the immense wisdom of a Person of perfection.

Ganesha Chaturdhi – A Public Event

Ganesh Chaturthi or "Vinayaka Chavithi" is one of the major traditional festivals celebrated by the Hindu community. It is observed in the Hindu calendar month of Bhadrapada, starting on the shukla chaturthi (fourth day of the crescent moon period). It falls between August and September. It is on this day Lord Shiva declared Ganesha as His son and He is the supreme to all Gods. Since then, an association between Ganesha and Chaturdhi has been established and thus the day is observed as Ganesh Chaturdhi. The festival lasts for 10 days, ending on Ananta Chaturdashi, and is sacredly celebrated as the birthday of Lord Ganesha.



Ganesha Chaturdhi as a public event celebrated all over India, it is most elaborate in Maharashtra, Orissa, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Tamil Nadu, Goa and Chhattisgarh. Outside India, it is celebrated widely in Nepal and also by the Hindus living in United States, Canada, Malaysia and Singapore and all over the world.

Ganesh Visarjan / Ganesh Nimarjjan

Ganesh Chaturdhi is celebrated as a social and religious gathering in the name of Ganesh Utsav. Pavilions/marquees and large public idols of Ganesha are arranged in the streets of villages and cities. The festival is celebrated as a public event for nine days in the name of Ganesh Navarathri Utsav. The priests worship the idols and offer 21 varieties of leaves, fruits and flowers with traditional customs and rituals. On the 10th day, the festival concludes with a rite called "Ganesh Visarjan" or Ganesh Nimarjjan" otherwise, called the immersion of Lord Ganesh and these large idols of Ganesha are immersed in the nearby rivers or lakes. Also, there is another custom called "Ganesh Laddu auction" where a huge laddu is auctioned on Ganesh Visarjan day. The slogan of "Ganapati Pappa Morya" reverberate the surroundings.



Narasimha Jayanthi & Story behind the Avatar

Narasimha is the fourth incarnation of Lord Vishnu and is popularly known as 'man-lion' or 'half man-half lion'. The main aim of Narasimha incarnation was to end the tyranny of *Hiranyakashipu* and restore the path of *Dharma*. *Prahlada* the young son of *Hiranyakashipu* was an ardent devotee of Lord Vishnu paved the way for the removal of *Adharma*. *Narasim*-

ha Jayanthi is observed on the 14th day of the Shukla Paksha (waxing phase of moon) in Vaisakha month (April - May). This year it was observed on May 2nd and SV Temple celebrated the first Narasimha Jayanthi (Narasimha Abhishekam) which was attended by many devotees and everyone received His blessings.



Story behind Narasimha Avatar

In Hindu Mythology a much importance is given to devotion, we get to see many examples of it like *Hanuman*- a devotee of Lord Rama, *Meerabai*- a devotee of Lord Krishna etc.,. A child devotee *Prahald* in spite of belonging to the Demon dynasty was considered as the supreme devotee of Lord Vishnu. Lord Vishnu appeared Himself as *Narasimha* for the sake of *Prahald* and saved all His devotees.

Hiranyakashipu, King of demons, became a greater enemy to Lord Vishnu as his brother Hiranyakshu died in the hands of Vishnu in Varaha Avatar. So Hiranyakashipu was filled with anger on Lord Vishnu and vowed to take revenge on Him. But he knew it will not be easy to defeat Lord Vishnu unless he acquires some special powers through Lord Brahma-the creator. So he decided to worship Lord Brahma and impress him. He retired to the mountain Mandara and began tapas- the severe order of penance. After several years of his tapas, Lord Brahma was pleased and appeared to him. He asked for a boon from Lord Brahma that he shouldn't be killed by any creature created by Brahma or in a house or outside or during day or night or by any weapon or on the land or in the sky. Brahma granted all these boons to Hiranyakashipu and disappeared.

After this blessing, the demon crossed all bounds in oppression and dethroned Indra, the king of heaven. Indra, along with other Gods, appeared before Brahma and prayed for deliverance. Brahma was very much worried and replied that the demon had become powerful due to the blessings bestowed by him and He could not destroy him. He also advised *Indra* to go to Lord Vishnu so all Gods went to Vishnu and retold their story of sufferings and said that due to boons given by Brahma the demon had been indulging in all sorts of oppression. Lord Vishnu promised to destroy him in due course of time.



Hiranyakahsipu had a son named Prahalad. Right from his very childhood Prahalad was attracted towards Lord Vishnu. Prahalad had not obeyed the orders of his father not to worship Vishnu. Gradually, he faced the anger of his mighty father. Hiranyakashipu started troubling all the devotees of Lord Vishnu including his son Prahalad. He was threatened to death and seriously punished for worshipping Lord Vishnu. But Prahalad didn't loose his faith on Vishnu, in fact became more determined.

Hiranyakashipu thought that Prahalad is a shame to demon dynasty for praising his enem Lord Vishnu. At last, he was ready to kill his son and ordered his demons to take him away and kill him. As their master ordered, the demons tried various methods to kill Prahalad such as putting him in a pit full of snakes, trampled him under the feet of elephants, tied him to a heavy stone and threw him in the ocean and from a height of a hill. But all their attempts failed. He continued to be strong enough in chanting the 'Narayan mantra' during his troubles. So, nothing did harm him.

Finally, *Hiranyakashipu* got mad and decided to kill his son with his own hands. *Hiranyakashipu* thundered at the boy asking for Lord Vishnu to come and save the boy in front of him. He could no longer able to control his anger and drew out his sword and pounced upon the little boy. There came a terrible deafening noise splitting the pillar into two and there appeared Sri Hari in the form of *Narasimha* (*Nara*= Man; *Simha*= Lion). He appeared with the head of a lion and body of a man fulfilling all of the

boons of *Hiranyakashipu*. Without using any weapon, Lord Vishnu in *Narasimha* form caught *Hiranyakashipu* with a loud roar placed the him on his lap and killed him using His sharp pointed claw like nails. Thus the wicked demon was finally killed at the hands of the man-lion, *Vishnu*.

Everyone tried to calm *Narasimha Swamy* including Goddess Lakshmi unsuccessfully but only *Prahalad* was able to do that. Then *Prahalad* touched the feet of *Narasimha* with his head in deep devotion. At the tender touch of *Prahalad* the Lord was pleased. He grew calm and his anger gave way to kindness. Lord *Narasimha* gave His blessings to *Prahalad*- the true devotee.

Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Minnesota Devalaya Charitra

(A History of the Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Minnesota Temple)

The Sri Venkateswara (Balaji) Temple in Edina, Minnesota was born from the sincere desire of local Minnesota bhaktas to worship Sri Venkateswara Swami in his full and unique grandeur.

On the auspicious day of Ugadi in 2009, Sri Madhusudhana Reddy and Dr. Jyothsna Reddy, with the support of several community members, established an independent temple dedicated to the pure service of Sri Venkateswara Swami. This temple was known as the Sri Venkateswara Center and was located in Golden Valley. On June 10th, the temple was incorporated as a nonprofit charitable organization. There was no permanent priest at the time and volunteers shared all the responsibilities. Bhaktas performed harathi and worshipped a framed image of Sri Venkateswara Swami. In November 2009, panchaloha utsava murtis of Sri Venkateswara Swami with Sri Devi and Bhudevi, Sri Mahalakshmi, and Sri Vinayaka were brought to the temple from India.

From twenty to thirty regular devotees, the temple community quickly swelled to hundreds, many of whom were young families with small children. In 2009 over 750 people attended the Diwali celebrations. In 2010, the Center established Balagokulam, a small school for children. At this time, the temple began to host meditation sessions, offer language, music, and dance classes, and organize social service projects in collaboration with homeless shelters like People Serving People. In 2010, the temple appointed its first full-time salaried priest, Sri Vamsi Kanduri, to manage daily worship and alankarams at the temple. Since then, the temple staff has expanded to include two more full-time salaried priests: Seshadri Komanduri and Pavan Kumar Kumanduri.

In 2010, the Sri Venkateswara Center organized a concert by the famous singer Sri S.P. Balasubramanyam in order to raise funds for a more permanent temple in a central part of the Minneapolis metropolitan area. On this occasion, many local leaders and bhaktas supported the event and made financial pledges to support the rapidly expanding temple. Later, during the Vaikunta Ekadasi celebrations of 2010, a dhoopadheepa aradhana seva triggered the temple fire alarm. Consequently, the City of Golden Valley notified the temple management that they could not host public events that exceeded the building capacity of 50 members. The community was given the devastating news that they had only 90 days to relocate. However, Sri Venkateswara Swami did not disappoint his devotees and very shortly after a beautiful new building was revealed in Edina. This new location was spacious, centrally located, and ideal by Vasthu stand-

ards. A small stream called "9-mile creek" flowed through the northeast section of the property and the main entrance faced east.

Although the Sri Venkateswara Center had collected significant financial support through pledges from its community members, banks did not recognize these as valid collateral. As a result, it was very difficult to obtain Therefore, the community turned temple to Sri Madhusudhana Reddy and Dr. Jyothsna Reddy to loan the necessary funds for purchasing the new building in Edina and to support remodeling the building to function as a temple. In August 2011, the community conducted a grand pranaprathistapana event when the temple murtis were transferred from the Golden Valley center to the new site in Edina. An especially fortunate development at this time was the introduction of panchaloha utsava murtis for Ashtalakshmi (8 forms of Lakshmi), Sri Hanuman, Sri Garuda, Sri Ramanujacharya, and several alvars. Since then, the Sri Venkateswara Center has been known as the "Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Temple." This is the first--and only--temple in the United States where Sri Venkateswara Swami is surrounded by the glory of all eight forms of Lakshmi Devi.

In 2012, the current Temple Board (Sri Madhusudhana Reddy, Dr. Jyothsna Reddy and Dr. Potapragada Venkateswarlu) announced its wish to expand the Temple Board and reorganize its legal structure. They requested temple donors to form a committee and produce new bylaws for the Temple that would ensure it was a broad and inclusive community-based organization. Recently, these new bylaws were determined and a new board and executive team will be established in the near future.

Following the move to Edina, the Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Temple has continued to grow and develop. In June 2015, a large auditorium with the capacity for 400 people was remodeled and made available to the community. Through the generous assistance of the Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams (TTD), the Temple has recently obtained beautiful granite vigrahas of Sri Venkateswara Swami (7'1"), Sri Mahalakshmi, Sri Bhudevi (Andal), Sri Ramanuja, Dasavatharams, Sri Garudalvar, and Dwarapalakas (Sri Jaya and Sri Vijaya). Currently, the Temple Board is consulting with a sthapathi in India to construct a Gopuram on the exterior of the temple and provide proper garbhagruhas for the new granite vigrahas These vigrahas inside temple. will be installed the pranaprathistapana rituals as soon as the temple has been fully renovated.

During its short history, the Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Temple has been honored with the blessings of many great saints, intellectuals, artists, and leaders. Some of these include Sri Vishwayogi Visvamji Maharaj, Sri. Medasani Mohan, Sri S.P. Balasubramanyam, Sri Mangalampalli Balamuralikrishna, and former President of India Dr. Abdul Kalam. The temple has also developed into a strong center for traditional Indian arts. In

2010, the temple encouraged local musicians by introducing "Nadotsavam" through two competitions, Carnatic Star and Bhakti Star. More than 100 people have participated in these competitions. In 2011, "Natyamanjari: A Festival of Dance" was introduced and has attracted more than 150 local dancers. These programs have been held annually since their introduction.

The Ashtalakshmi Sameta Sri Venkateswara Temple recently celebrated its fourth "Annual Day Celebrations" on Aug 8th, 2015. Since 2009, bhaktas from across Minnesota, the Midwest, the United States, and even India, have arrived for the unique and holy darshan of Sri Venkateswara Swami at this temple. At present, there are over 2,750 bhaktas who have registered with the Temple. Many young couples who face difficulties in having children find themselves blessed after darshan and prayers to Sri Venkateswara Swami in Edina. One devotee from Texas said that he was able to have children after struggling for five years. Due to this fact, many people refer to Venkateswara Swami in Edina as "Santana Venkateswara." Under the generous grace of Sri Maha Lakshmi Devi in her 8 glorious forms, the Sri Venkateswara Temple of Edina continues to prosper and provide a peaceful shelter to the bhaktas of the Lord Sri Venkateswara Swami.
